Assists foreign national victims of human trafficking by providing comprehensive case management in the areas of:


- social

ALERT works in partnership with local law enforcement and The Department of Homeland Security in providing safety and security for identified victims.


ALERT served 70 foreign victims of trafficking in FY2022.




ALERT Over the Years (2003 – 2022)



Total clients served: 345








FY22 OVC Comprehensive Services

 - provide assistance or referrals to other essential services for victims of human trafficking
 - 4) collect data and participate in assessment activities to determine if the program is meeting stated goals and objectives

 regardless of age or gender



- 4) ensure data collection and participation in evaluation activities to determine if the program is meeting state goals and objectives
- Any minor victim of labor trafficking (foreign or domestic)

- o The right to keep your immigration and identification
- o The right to complain without fear or retaliation against you
- o The right to collective action and joining co-workers to as for better treatment at work
